How Effective Priests Handle Controversy and Clergy Abuse

Thirty-six effective and respected priests across the U.S. were asked how they deal with the institutional controversies in the Church. What came out of these discussions was neither a disdain for, nor a deference to, the institutional dimensions of the Church, but rather, a healthy distance. A priest from the Midwest summed it up, "I think you have to come to grips with where you stand with the Church as an institution. For me it's a healthy distance and acceptance of the humanity of it all!" These men love the Church. But they are critical lovers because they want the Church to be all that it can be. And they are loving critics of the Church. But for them, the Church means more than an institution. "I love the Church," said one pastor. "It's not perfect and once I realized that I was comfortable. I experience Church primarily at the local level, in my parish." A Southern priest put it this way, "Yes, there are issues that are going to be discussed, the issue of women's ordination, celibacy, selection of bishops, clergy abuse, etc. But the issues of priesthood for me are the issues of the people of God right here along with us in the parish!"

In confronting the bishop, the approach of these priests was this: It depends on whether he is convinced that it is a worthwhile issue to confront. It is something like the serenity prayer, knowing what you can change, and what you can't. But you still have the obligation to speak up and speak truth to power. But you have to realize that you can't control the bishop's response to your confrontation. While they don't always agree with some of the Church laws and teachings, they realize they have no authority to resolve it. "I can't say I'm really comfortable with everything we do in the Church or teach, but I don't want to leave. There is tension. There is conflict. But there is vitality and joy!" said a West Coast priest.

Clergy Abuse Crisis

The reaction of effective priests to this issue is mixed. On the one hand, they see it having a devastating impact on the Church and the image of priesthood. Some of the priests felt a stigma and a suspicion when they represented "priesthood" to people who did not know them but felt no problem around the people who knew them. A priest from the Midwest said, "Sometimes out in the city with a collar on, I feel people projecting all kinds of stuff on me. But in the parish, I feel very little of it. It doesn't get in my way, and it doesn't limit my ministry. I have earned their trust!"

On the other hand, these priests saw the publicity of these scandals as a "graced moment," because they called forth an honesty and an end of denial from Church leaders and has brought forth a deep compassion for the victims. A Southern priest said, "Maybe this is good because it may be the beginning of the death knell of clericalism." An Eastern priest said, "I think the blessing of all this has been, ironically, that we've finally been responding to the victims in a sensitive way, which was a terrible blind spot for the institution."

A Midwest priest said, "The scandals hurt. But somehow, I can handle that. And I know, that as an individual, I can make a statement about what it means to be a healthy and effective priest in the larger society." What seems clear is that these priests hoped to be perceived and judged as individuals rather than as a group. There seems to be a shift here. Thirty years ago, "the reputation of the priesthood" was able to "carry" or give credibility to individual priests. Today, because of the scandals and the damage to the reputation of the priesthood, individual priests, by their faithful ministry, are "carrying" and giving credibility to "the priesthood"! These effective priests do not shy away from controversy, whether it involves scandals or institutional confrontations. They feel capable of handling controversy when they turn to their most effective resources, the life-giving power of the Gospel, the people they know and serve, their own sense of mission, and their trust that somehow God's grace is in all this! St. Dominic School

My Dear Friends,

Founded in September 1934, St. Dominic School will celebrate its 90th birthday this year. It is a tremendous credit to the generations of families at St. Dominic that an outstanding education has been provided for so many generations of children. It is no easy task to begin and then sustain a Catholic school. It takes vision, commitment, determination, sheer willpower, and hard work, not to mention the time, treasure, and talent poured in by so many faithful Catholics for generations. This was the commitment shown by your great-grandparents, grandparents, and parents. Today's St. Dominic families exhibit the same desire to maintain our Catholic school and we are committed to this dream. The first ninety years is only the beginning, the next ninety will be just as glorious.

As the summer goes on, you will hear more about how we plan to celebrate our 90th year, but we thought you would like an update on what has been happening around the school as far as renewal of the campus is concerned. Last summer, we asked a group of parishioners to walk through the school building with Jenny O'Brien, our principal, and Charlie DeZarn, our business manager. We asked this group to look at the school building and report on what they thought would help make the school an even better environment for our families. They were to pay attention to these areas: what needs to be done immediately, what can be done over the next year, and what would some long-range projects involve. Last summer, the group came back with an excellent outline of projects that they thought would enhance our school building and so the lives of our students. We have been working through this list of projects in the last year and will continue to do so this summer. Here are some of the projects that have already taken place in 2023-2024: Painting of all school corridors; Repainting of the Statue of St. Dominic and refurbishing of old closet to a niche inside front entrance; Repainting of school cafeteria; Seventy-five new security cameras throughout school, church, and exterior of buildings; Increased security lighting around exterior of school building; New exit door in gym; New signage on exterior of gym; Exterior of gym painted; New carpet in school reception area; New drainage and drains on the Pedretti side of the school building; Introduction of the Theology of the Body Curriculum; Installation of new phone, PA, and security alert system; and Replacing of tiles to the library entrance.

New School Projects - Summer 2024 and beyond:

Canopies for playground on Pedretti side of school (in progress); Canopies for school front entrance; Creating a new dining area for preschool (in progress); Painting of ceilings in school corridors (in progress); Architect drawings for development of new STEAM Academy (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) in old convent section; Development of teachers' lounge on first floor (in progress); Development of drawings for entrance area to school, reception and administrative offices; Look into soundproofing of the cafeteria; Possible replacement of interior classroom doors and exterior doors to new security doors; Rubberized mulch in playground area to replace regular mulch; Redevelopment of gym entrance area; Refurbishing of toilets in cafeteria area; Possible new ramp to Kindergarten/preschool entrance; and Development of Student Remote Learning Room (in progress).

Some of these projects have been funded by State grants, parish/school structural funds, as well as gifts and bequests from parishioners. It is our intention to continue to redevelop St. Dominic school infrastructure and campus and also to build an outstanding Catholic education program for our children today and tomorrow. Thank you for making that happen and for all your support of St. Dominic School and Parish. With God all things are possible and through you He makes great things happen.
