Please note the schedule for our Holy Week services. The Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening begins at 7:00 p.m. Our Good Friday Celebrations of the Lord's Passion are at Noon and 7:00 p.m. (Please note that there will be no touching or kissing the crucifix at the Veneration of the Cross. A simple bow or genuflection will be the appropriate expression this year.) The Easter Vigil is on Saturday evening beginning at 8:00 p.m. Our celebration will be simpler this year as there will be no Baptisms.

On Easter Sunday, our Masses are at 7:30, 9:30, and 11:30 a.m. We will be observing social distancing so we will not be packing people in. When the church is appropriately filled, we will direct people to O'Connor Hall for live streaming. If that is filled, we will ask people to go home and live stream. With the pandemic, please prayerfully consider live streaming the Holy Week services.

My hope and prayer for you this coming Holy Week is that you will respond with gratitude to the God who gives you the time of your life. And may that gratitude find expression in your giving back to God some of your prime time on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter. May the Holy Week liturgies fill your hearts with love and gratitude for the salvation that is ours because of Jesus Christ and His Passion, death, and Resurrection! End your Lent well and may you all have a Happy Easter!

Join Us at The Wailing Wall

For over 2,000 years, the Jewish people and many of all religions, have taken their prayers of grief and sorrow to the Wailing Wall in Jerusalem. Prayers and lamentations of all sorts have been written on slips of paper and placed in the crevices of the wall and prayers have been said, silently and aloud, for God to receive these intercessions and show His love and mercy to the sorrowing.

We have all experienced a year marked with many sorrows, individually, as a nation and as a global community. With the Covid-19 pandemic, natural disasters, national unrest and increasing poverty, hunger and homelessness, we are all sharing in the grief of the world. We are all mourning the loss of so many brothers and sisters in the Lord due to many usual factors of disease and violence, but the numbers of those who have lost their battle with the Coronavirus have catapulted these total numbers into the millions worldwide.

During this season of Lent, we invite you to share any grief that you have experienced and offer it back to God by joining us at the "Wailing Wall." Here at St. Dominic, we are building our own "Wailing Wall" on the walls of the Gathering Place. Our children will be adding their prayers of sorrow to this wall by writing them down on "stones" of paper. Their prayers will become the foundation of our wall. You are invited to join your prayers with the prayers of the parish by sending an email to **myfaith@ stdominicdelhi.org**. We will then take what you are grieving and write it on a stone and add it to the wall. (We are doing it this way to maintain Covid-19 protocol and allow anonymity for everyone.) These stones will be added throughout Lent and the paper stones will become the "kindling" for the fire at our Easter Vigil which will become the Light of Christ! This way, as we give our sorrows back to God, Christ redeems our grief with hope in the Resurrection. Let us pray for one another as we offer our sorrows to the Lord.

St. Vincent de Paul Society St. Dominic Conference

Because of the pandemic and due to the ages of the St. Dominic St. Vincent de Paul volunteers and the dangers of meeting face-to-face, St. Dominic's St. Vincent de Paul has replaced our weekly in-person meetings with telephone conference meetings every other week. Rather than in-home visits, we now conduct all our interviews on the phone. When we deliver food to our neighbors, we wear our masks and put the food on our neighbors' porches. St. Dominic's St. Vincent de Paul needs some younger members. Our current group of volunteers has a median age of 78 and we need "new" blood to keep the organization strong.

The Covid-19 virus has NOT slowed down the generosity of the members of St. Dominic parish or the needs of our neighbors. You have been amazingly generous to St. Vincent de Paul. St. Dominic's St. Vincent de Paul's total receipts for the second half of 2020 were \$25,844.47 from the poor box collections, the parishioner donations, the schoolchildren, and member donations.

Because of your generous donations and money left over from previous periods, from July through December 2020, St. Dominic's SVdP provided \$30,162.27 in aid to 233 of our neighborhood families made up of 545 adults and children. This includes over \$2,000 in Kroger gift cards for families at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

The breakdown of the aid that was given is as follows: Duke Energy \$ 6,485.52 Water Bills \$ 1,680.92 Food & Kroger Gift Cards \$ 7,280.04 SVdP Pharmacy, SVdP dues, and other services \$ 1,329.93 "Twinning Help" to neighboring \$ 12,785.86 Rent & Mortgage Assistance 600.00 SVdP Conferences \$

Remember that St. Dominic's St. Vincent de Paul Conference has NO overhead, personnel or office expenses. Every cent that is donated is used to help our neighbors. If you wish to make a donation "In honor of" or "In memory of" someone, there are envelopes and donation cards at all the entrances to St. Dominic Church. The gift will be acknowledged by a handwritten note to the recipient. The honoree will know you have honored them with a gift to help our neighbors.

This is a truly beautiful book that will companion you through each of the Stations of the Cross, offering Scripture readings and reflections as well as questions with space for your journaling. This contemporary artist enfolds each Station with imagery that leads your heart to prayer. This book is available on Amazon for \$14.95.

A Saint A Day Lent Devotional: 40 Daily Lenten Devotions for Christians, by Elizabeth Caldwell. This book has a Saint for each day of Lent with information about their life and faith experience as well as Scripture passages and space for your own reflective writing. Follow Lent by walking in the shoes of the Saints and learn from their relationship with God. This book is available on Amazon for \$7.99.

Lent in Plain Sight, by Jill J. Duffield. This contemporary author uses ten ordinary objects of our daily life, such as water, dust, bread, to elucidate our Lenten experience.
